



The Cambridge Online EBP Leaders' Short Course POLICING TO REDUCE SERIOUS VIOLENCE

Challenge. How do we identify the people and places at highest risk of serious violence? How do we update those forecasts, every day, to better use police resources to prevent crime? The answer lies in more evidence-based crime analysis for proactive strategies.

Objectives. This **online** course, spread across 5 weeks from each learner's starting date, will help police force leaders (sergeants and above) to become more effective at delivering the following urgent tasks for any strategy to reduce serious violence:

- Identifying people most likely to be victimized by, or to commit, serious violence
- Tracking serious violent crime using a Crime Harm Index (CHI)
- Predicting the most likely micro-hotspots for murders and GBH assaults
- Tracking police activities by hotspots in relation to crime trends
- Feedback and digital alarms to patrol teams for delivery of patrol time by hotspot
- Tracking—and deterring—criminal networks producing serious violence
- Testing the violence-reduction impact of police strategies applied to specific targets
